17	Employees' Benefit Program Board meeting. It's April 29th,
18	at 1:30 p.m. We're a few of us are at the Richard Bryan
19	Building in Carson City, and I'll just go ahead and list who
20	I think is on the phone. Linda Fox, Mandy Hagler, Tom
21	Verducci, Christine Zack and Leah Lamborn. Did I miss
22	anybody?
23	And Don Bailey is excused, and I'm here in Carson
24	along with Dr. Packham. CAPITOL REPORTERS (775)882-5322

We'll go to Agenda Item Number One, role call. 1 MR. HAYCOCK: That's fine. Can I say something 2 3 real quick. For the record Damon Haycock. Today we do not have a reporter from Capitol 4 Reporters actually transcribing these as we speak. 5 sure anybody who talks on the phone identify yourself first 6 for the record. We will send over the audio to be 7 transcribed as quickly as possible at the end of this 8 9 meeting. Thank you. 10 CHAIRWOMAN CONTINE: We already did the role call so I'll move on to Item Number Two, public comment. Is there 11 12 any public comment in Carson City? MR. ERVIN: Good afternoon. 13 Kent Ervin, E-r-v-i-n, representing the Nevada Faculty Alliance, the 14 independent statewide association of faculty of all eight 15 NSHE institutions. 16 17 NFA opposes an increase to CDHP employee premiums from FY19, particularly from FY19 levels, particularly when 18 19 excess reserves continue to be accumulated and returned via HSA and HRA contributions. 20 21 Further, NFA opposes an increase to HMO/EPO, 22 employee premiums and rates could be held flat based on 23 contractual relationships and recent experience.

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Prior to about 2011 the employee premium for the

base or high deductible plan in PEBP for the single employee tier was zero. Since employee premiums and single employees have been charged since then excess reserves have accumulated every year.

PEBP has always taken the available funding from the budget process and had to balance the benefits and employee premiums to stay fiscally sound and needs to be able to continue to do that.

The -- to put things in perspective, and we don't know at this point what is going to be proposed on at the budget hearings on May 1st and May 4th exactly, but from what I hear about increase of anywhere five to \$20 a month in premiums for a single employee, that's not huge. However, \$10 a month is roughly 0.25 percentage points decrease for a classified employee at the median salary for classified. So that just offsets a COLA increase.

And finally the delayed and short and open enrollment period will be a hardship for faculty who are academic year contracts, many of whom depart from campus after the end of the semester in mid May.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment.

MS. MALONEY: Good afternoon to the Board. And my name is Priscilla Malone with the AFSCME retirees.

So I just want to say a couple of things. Coming CAPITOL REPORTERS (775)882-5322

from a place of not having a ton of information about, at this point about what the proposed change will look like. We do have information from Executive Director Haycock and, again, I want to stress as I have so many times in the past that Director Haycock is very good about reaching out to the advocacy groups.

So we received some information on Monday,
April 22nd with some charts and graphs that show what this
will possibly look at -- look like, I beg your pardon. And
my understanding is that what is being proposed sits
somewhere quote between option one and option two that was
presented at the March 28th rate-setting board meeting, and
that there will actually -- and I'm hoping that the
discussion will cover this, that there may be an actual
decrease on the HMO/EPO, but hopefully the discussion between
the Board members will clear that up.

But still, as Dr. Ervin said, there will be an increase on members who are on the CDHP, both active employees and pre Medicare or non Medicare retirees. And globally the direction I have, I not only am speaking today apparently from for the AFSCME retirees but apparently also for, I've gotten some direction on what the position is for the active AFSCME 4041 members and simply that concerning that it will -- it's concerning to the active members that, CAPITOL REPORTERS (775)882-5322

as Dr. Ervin said, this delay in the open enrollment, we appreciate the problem, but that could -- we just want it noted for the record that could cause problems for some of our classified employees.

And also that, of course, globally, again, any increase in premiums to the state work force at this point in their lives where, you know, for the last decade it's been problematic. That we would globally oppose that but, again, my final directive here is that -- that the actives hope that Director Haycock work with the Governor and the legislature to come up with a solution that minimizes negative impacts on both the actives and, of course, on the pre Medicare and non Medicare retirees. Thank you.

CHAIRWOMAN CONTINE: Thank you.

Is there any other public comment in Carson City?

Okay. Seeing none, we'll move on to Agenda Item

Number Three, PEBP board disclosures for applicable Board

meeting agenda items. Brandee Mooneyhan for the attorney -
from the Attorney General's office.

MS. MOONEYHAN: Thank you, Madam Chair. Again,
Brandee Mooneyhan, deputy attorney general on behalf of PEBP.
I offer this disclosure pursuant the Nevada ethic law on
behalf of all Board members who are eligible for PEBP
benefits.

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Of the current Board members, all except Ms. Zack and Mr. Verducci are eligible for PEBP benefits which means that they, their spouses and dependents may receive health, dental, life insurance and other benefits through PEBP.

On today's Agenda Items Four and Five relate

On today's Agenda Items Four and Five relate directly to benefits available to PEBP members, namely possible changes to the open enrollment period for plan year 2020 and procedures for finalizing rates and participant premiums for plan year 2020.

when PEBP members vote on -- Board members vote on members for themselves or their spouses or their dependents that may trigger the disclosure requirements under NRS 281A.420. So on behalf of the Board members who are PEBP participants, I offer this as a general disclosure pursuant to that ethics law.

I also note the Board members who PEBP participants may still vote on the items directly effecting their benefits, if the benefit or detriment to them is not greater than that accruing to similarly situated PEBP members.

Thank you, Madam Chair. And I invite anyone who has anything to add in this regard to do so now.

MEMBER VERDUCCI: Yes, thank you. This is Tom.

CHAIRWOMAN CONTINE: Go ahead, Mr. Verducci. CAPITOL REPORTERS (775)882-5322

MEMBER VERDUCCI: Thank you. Tom Verducci for 1 2 the record. 3 I just want to point out that I accepted a 4 position with Voya Financial. Today is my first day I'm going to be working on the Washoe County deferred 5 compensation program. They were awarded the program through 6 a competitive RFP process, and nothing that I'll be doing 7 effects -- will affect PEBP in any way because I'll be 8 9 working on the investment side of it, but I wanted to provide that as a disclosure. 10 11 CHAIRWOMAN CONTINE: Thank you. 12 Is there anybody else on the phone that would 13 like to make a comment? Dr. Packham? 14 15 All right. Moving along then to Item Number Four, discussion and possible action to allow and approve 16 PEBP to finalize plan year 2020 rate and participant premium 17 upon final decision by the Nevada Legislature to approve 18 19 employer contribution subsidy at PEBP's budget closing 20 hearing. 21 And Damon Haycock from PEBP, go ahead. 22 MR. HAYCOCK: Thank you, Madam Chair. 23 Haycock for the record. 24 The Nevada Legislature is scheduled to approve CAPITOL REPORTERS (775)882-5322

PEBP's biennial budget for the next two fiscal years. The first meeting is scheduled and it's on Nellis now or on the legislative website. It's a subcommittee on general government on May 1st, this Wednesday at 8:00 a.m., and we are told, but we haven't seen the posting yet, that the full committee is scheduled to meet on May 4th.

There are still outstanding decisions to make on the employer contribution, the subsidy that the legislature approves in the appropriations bills every two years which will affect our participant premiums starting July 1, 2019.

You all approved plan year 2020 rates and premiums back on March 28th. You also approved PEBP the allowance to make technical adjustments to those rates as needed. PEBP's budget, of course, must be approved by the legislature and, therefore, PEBP requests that the Board designate legislative budget approval as a technical adjustment to allow us to revise plan year rates and premiums in accordance with their appropriations.

What that basically means is that PEBP won't have to -- if you follow PEBP's recommendations today, we will not have to check you all again to approve rates which segues into the next agenda item about the lack of time we have for noticing those rights.

So we still have the open meeting law CAPITOL REPORTERS (775)882-5322

requirements of a three-day notice, and then we have to get a quorum together for you to approve and with the timeframe down to the wire, especially if we don't get final approval or knowledge of the exact appropriations until May 4th, then -- then this could cause some major issues with folks being able to access care and see their rates and pick their plans on time.

approves what that appropriation is, once they have nailed down exactly what they want to provide the state or excuse me, to provide on behalf of the state to PEBP members, we will plug that number into our rate development process and offset the cost of the rates that you guys have already approved, up or down, based on the members premiums and to do that with your approval as the technical adjustment. So we can then turn around and notice those rates timely.

So that is our recommendation and if you have any questions, I can take them now, Madam Chair.

CHAIRWOMAN CONTINE: Are there any questions from the Board?

MEMBER VERDUCCI: Yes. This is Tom Verducci.

I was wondering if Officer Haycock could speak
for a moment on the Health Plan of Nevada opportunity to give
us flat rates. Are we in a position now that we're giving up
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the flat rates and looking at a 3.7 percent increase?

2 MR. HAYCOCK: Thank you for the question, 3 Mr. Verducci. Damon Haycock for the record.

The answer is potentially. The -- there were two offers, originally there was three which was a four percent increase by Health Plan of Nevada. And then when we received the Governor's recommended budget holding us to 3.7 percent inflation, they lowered it 3.7 to be good partners.

They came back right before our rate-setting meeting and asked if we were planning to lower member premiums on the HMO and EPO blend, and at that time we -- we had an opportunity, we thought that we could do that, and so they wanted to come back and give us a flat rate to make that even a larger decrease to the member because they don't want to lose anymore folks out of their HMO plan.

Over multiple years there has been migration out of the HMO plans, and they have lost thousands of members and as we all know in health insurance, the more people you have the easier it is to offset those high costs and they come in on a small part of the population.

So if it turns out that the legislatively approved appropriations does not -- does not result in a reduced member premium across all of the tiers on the HMO and EPO plans, then the -- the zero percent rate hold is no CAPITOL REPORTERS (775)882-5322

longer available and we will be at the 3.7 percent increase. 1 Does that answer your question, Mr. Verducci? 2 MEMBER VERDUCCI: Yes, it certainly does. 3 4 really wasn't what I wanted to hear but thank you. CHAIRWOMAN CONTINE: Are there any other 5 questions on the telephone? 6 Dr. Packham, do you have anything? 7 8 Most of the public comment was already made at 9 the beginning. We'll just go ahead and go into the item. Is there any -- any other discussion, any discussion from the 10 11 Board members? 12 MEMBER VERDUCCI: Yes. This is Tom Verducci 13 again. And over the last several years we fought really 14 hard to keep rates flat and when we've been in surplus years, 15 and, you know, I'm a little disappointed that if we do have 16 17 to increase rates, hearing from our advocacy groups that they 18 are in opposition, I certainly hope that something could be 19 done to legislate -- the legislature level or the Governor's office in an attempt to keep these rates flat. 20 21 CHAIRWOMAN CONTINE: Thank you. Is there any 22 other discussion? Is there a motion to accept PEBP's recommendation that PEBP is authorized to make technical 23 24 adjustments to the plan year 2020 rates based on legislative CAPITOL REPORTERS (775)882-5322

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decision making on PEBP's fiscal year 2020 budget?

                MR. HAYCOCK: Thank you, Madam Chair. Damon

    Haycock for the record.

                This report, I'm not going to read it word for
23
    word, but basically we have a noticing requirement in statute
24
    that any changes to premiums and rates be communicated in
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writing to the membership no less than 30 days or at least 30 days before the effective date of these changes.

That would mean during our normal open enrollment of May 1st to May 31st that we would have to notice no later than May 1st. Now, we still have a subcommittee meeting that day. We have a potential full committee meeting on the 4th. And any changes to rates we would have to re-notice, and we would no longer be in compliance with our open enrollment period.

We also, once there's changes done to these rates, they have to be programmed and loaded into our eligibility and enrollment system, and as part of that programming there is a testing phase to ensure all of the different types of rates and nuances are accurate, and that's not something that can be done quickly. It's something that is done very methodically and we do it every year generally from about the beginning, first week of April all the way up until open enrollment.

So we're looking at truncating this time again to try to get these rates in place if they do change. Again, it's not just the overall rate. It's the member share and state share. So all of that math, all of the different parts to that process needs to be tested, tested in multiple areas.

One in how it's displayed to our membership and, two, how we CAPITOL REPORTERS (775)882-5322

actually collect it and bill for it on the back end.

So there's a piece that you all will see when you look at your rates on-line, but there's another piece just as important on the back end that has to be accurate or we will be billing incorrectly, and we can potentially be in an insolvent position.

Now, changing open enrollment, as you heard from Mr. Ervin, as you heard from Ms. Malone that, you know, this causes some heartburn, as it should, because it is something that we are not used to and that we were not planning for, but at this point we don't feel that we have any other option but to ensure that the accuracy of what we put in our system and to ensure that folks will get what they need in time to seek services on the first day of the actual plan year on July 1st.

So PEBP is taking the loss of those two weeks from June 1st or excuse me, the loss of the week from June 1st to June 7th and we are going to absorb that internally, operationally as an administrative, you know, load onto what we're doing to kind of rush what we're doing to make sure that we can get files and eligibility information out to the HPN, HMO plan, the HSA funding that needs to be loaded into everyone's system the first week of July, any HRA fund balances that need to be loaded both on CAPITOL REPORTERS (775)882-5322

the Exchange and off.

And so there's a lot of things that happen in the last couple of weeks of June, and we're going to be truncating our ability to do that. So we are definitely adding in risk, but at this point if there's going to be a change to what was approved on March 28th, which it appears to PEBP's knowledge there will be, any change means that we have to reprogram and retest, and so we don't want to move open enrollment. We don't like moving open enrollment. My staff are not excited about the additional work that they are going to have to truncate. However, we don't feel that we have a choice and with that, I'll take any questions.

CHAIRWOMAN CONTINE: Are there any questions on the telephone? Any questions in Carson City? Any discussion?

MEMBER VERDUCCI: Yes, Tom Verducci for the record.

I think it's going to be necessary to move these dates, and I would like to -- I'm ready to make a motion unless there's further discussion.

21 CHAIRWOMAN CONTINE: Go ahead, Mr. Verducci.

MEMBER VERDUCCI: Okay. Yeah, I would like to recommend revising the open enrollment this year to May 20th, 2019, to June 7 of 2019.
